Lyrical Dance Definition

Lyrical dance is a dance style that blends ballet and jazz dance. Lyrical is generally smoother and a bit faster than ballet, but not quite as fast as jazz. A lyrical dancer uses movement to express strong emotions such as love, joy and anger.

History

- Born in the early 20th century, lyrical dance is a dance style that centres on a dancer's own interpretations instead of structured steps. Lyrical dance encourages dancers to use their emotions and moods to design their own steps and routines.
- Martha Graham is considered the pioneer of the concentrated movements of contraction and release. Instead of striving for long, fluid movements, Graham's movements were sharp and jagged.

Martha Graham

- Martha Graham was born in 1894 in the US.
- She started dancing later in life when she joined a junior arts college. Following college, Martha trained at Denishawn for 8 years, as both a student and teacher/choreographer.
- Ted Shawn created a dance just for her called, "Xochital."
 Graham danced the role of an attacked Aztec maiden. It was
 the wildly emotional performance of this role that garnered
 her first critical acclaim.



- She went on to create the Martha Graham School of Contemporary Dance in New York
- Graham believed that through spastic movements, tremblings, and falls she could
 express emotional and spiritual themes ignored by other styles of dance. She desired
 to evoke strong emotions and achieved these visceral responses through the repetition
 of explicitly sexual and violently disjunctive movements.

Martha Graham Contemporary Dance Company

- It was formed in 1926
- Martha ran the company for 66 years before passing it off.
- the Company brings to life a timeless and uniquely American style of dance that has influenced generations of artists and continues to captivate audiences
- Graham and her Company have expanded contemporary dance's vocabulary of movement and forever altered the scope of the art form by rooting works in contemporary social, political, psychological, and sexual contexts, deepening their impact and resonance.
- the Company is actively working to create new platforms for contemporary dance and multiple avenues for audiences to experience and understand these compelling works.













Further Description...

- Lyrical dance is a style that is largely based off ballet technique.
- Lyrical can be compared and is definitely used in comparison with contemporary and modern, and many use the 3 names interchangeably.
- Lyrical dance focuses on the story of the music and tries to depict that story through the moments.
- Because of this there are now many different types of lyrical dance: lyrical jazz, lyrical hip hop, and lyrical ballet are the most common forms.
- It is common now for most male-female duets to perform lyrical pieces opposed to other styles because of all the possibilities to tell a story through partnering and lifts.

Description Continued

- Lyrical dance often breaks the technique rules of ballet for the sake of conveying emotions.
- The focus of lyrical dance is mostly to portray themes of social justice and to tell stories that move people emotionally.
- Because of this lyrical dance has made impacts all around the world.
- Dance in the last few decades has become more about expression rather than perfection.

- You will want to invest in both technique and acting lessons.

- Take lyrical and contemporary workshops from different artists to keep growing your dance vocabulary.
- Make sure you understand the concept of a piece and become invested in it.
- Lyrical dance can help you discover your inner emotions and express them in a healthy way. And this is one of the reasons it has become a beloved dance style.
